

Threatened plants of the Granite Belt

Kardomia granitica (Granite kardomia)



Conservation status

- Vulnerable – Qld (NC Act 1992)

Description

- Shrub to 2m.
- Bark grey and fissured.
- Leaves:
 - 2.5-3.3 mm x 0.1-1.4 mm
 - lance-shaped, widest in the upper third
 - margins minutely toothed.

Flowers and fruit

- Flowers:
 - white and solitary
 - hypanthium wart-like, stamens 5-9.
- Flowering occurs from November to January.
- Fruit a capsule containing flattened D-shaped seeds.

Habitat and distribution

- Endemic to the Granite Belt.
- Recorded from:
 - Ballandean and Nundubemere
 - the Pyramid and Doctor's Creek in Girraween National Park.
- Found on expansive granite outcrops that provide a fire refuge.
