

Threatened plants of the Granite Belt

Boronia amabilis (Wyberba boronia)



Conservation status

- Near threatened – Qld (NC Act 1992)
- Not listed – Federal (EPBC Act 1999)

Description

- Erect, many-branched shrub to 3 m.
- Leaf stem winged.
- Leaves:
 - with 3-15 leaflets either side of stem
 - leaflets oblong, occurring in 3-7 pairs
 - discolourous, lower surface white.
 - leaflet hairs are simple and star-like occurring on both surfaces.

Flowers and fruit

- Flowers:
 - pink
 - 4 petals and 8 stamens
- Flowering occurs from August to January.
- Fruit a capsule containing projectile seed.

Habitat and distribution

- Endemic to the Granite Belt.
- Recorded from:
 - Ballandean and Wyberba
 - Girraween National Park.
- Found in heathy open forests, woodlands and shrublands.
