

Threatened plants of the Granite Belt

Persoonia daphnoides (Daphne-leaved geebung)



Conservation status

- Near threatened – Qld (NC Act 1992)
- Not listed – Federal (EPBC Act 1999)

Description

- Prostrate shrub.
- Young branchlets moderately to densely hairy.
- Leaves:
 - egg-shaped to spoon-shaped
 - 15-50 mm long x 4-20 mm wide
 - hairless with recurved margins.

Flowers and fruit

- Flowers:
 - flower stalk moderately to densely hairy
 - yellow in colour.
- Flowering occurs from January to April.
- Fruit comprises a single seed within green flesh becoming soft and edible when ripe.

Habitat and distribution

- Endemic to the New England Tableland.
- Recorded from Girraween National Park (south-west edge of Dingo Swamp)
- Found in open forests.
- More common east of the Granite Belt.
