

Threatened plants of the Granite Belt

Agiortia cicatricata



Conservation status

- Near threatened – Qld (NC Act 1992)
- Not listed – Federal (EPBC Act 1999)

Description

- Slender, erect shrub to 60 cm high.
- Leaves:
 - linear-lanceolate, margins recurved
 - 9.9–16.6 mm long, 1.4–2.5 mm wide
 - margin recurved
 - discolourous
 - upper surface convex, lower surface glaucous and strongly ridged.

Flowers and fruit

- Flowers:
 - white in 2-6 erect spikes
 - corolla lobes distinctly hairy.
- Flowering occurs from July to September.
- Fruit small, fleshy.

Habitat and distribution

- Found in south-eastern Queensland and northern New South Wales.
- Recorded from the South Bald Rock area of Girraween National Park.
- Found in heathy shrubland on high granite outcrops.
