

Threatened plants of the Granite Belt

Conospermum burgessiorum (Smokebush)



Conservation status

- Near threatened – Qld (NC Act 1992)
- Not listed – Federal (EPBC Act 1999)

Description

- Shrub 1-3 metres tall.
- Contains many spreading branches.
- Leaves:
 - narrow-lanceolate to linear, slightly curved
 - 50-250 mm x 10 mm
 - flat, sparsely hairy to hairy
 - veins visible on both surfaces.

Flowers and fruit

- Flowers:
 - inflorescence paniculate in upper leaf axils
 - equal to or shorter than subtending leaves
 - cream to white in colour.
- Flowering occurs in October and November.
- Fruit comprises many seeds in a capsule.

Habitat and distribution

- Endemic to the New England Tableland.
- Recorded from Girraween National Park.
- Found in open forests, woodlands and shrublands.
