

Threatened plants of the Granite Belt

Melaleuca flavovirens (Green bottlebrush)



Conservation status

- Near threatened – Qld (NC Act 1992)
- Not listed – Federal (EPBC Act 1999)

Description

- Shrub to 3 metres high.
- Robust but straggly.
- Leaves:
 - oblanceolate
 - 35-80 mm long x 4-12 mm wide
 - lower surface roughened by protruding oil dots
 - apex sharply pointed.

Flowers and fruit

- Flowers:
 - spike to 55 mm in diameter
 - filaments yellow-green in colour.
- Flowering occurs in September and October.
- Fruit, a capsule to 9 mm in diameter.

Habitat and distribution

- Endemic to the New England Tableland.
- Recorded from:
 - Nundubbermere, Glen Aplin, Eukey
 - Ballandean, Girraween National Park.
- Found on expansive granite outcrops.
