

Threatened plants of the Granite Belt

Eucalyptus codonocarpa (Bell-fruited mallee ash)



Conservation status

- Near threatened – Qld (NC Act 1992)
- Not listed – Federal (EPBC Act 1999)

Description

- Slender mallee to 6 metres high.
- Bark:
 - smooth, grey, yellow or brownish
 - sometimes ribbons of shed bark hanging from the upper branches.
- Leaves:
 - glossy green on both sides
 - lance-shaped to slightly curved
 - 65-150 mm long x 10-20 mm wide
 - leaf stalk 5-20 mm long.

Flowers and fruit

- Mature buds are club-shaped.
- Flowers white, in clusters of 3 or 7.
- Flowering occurs from March to June.
- Fruit a woody, bell-shaped capsule containing small, black seeds.

Habitat and distribution

- Endemic to the New England Tableland.
- Recorded from the Mt Norman and Castle Rock areas of Girraween National Park.
- Found in crevices of expansive granite outcrops.
