

Threatened plants of the Granite Belt

Dodonaea hirsuta (Hairy hopbush)



Conservation status

- Vulnerable – Qld (NC Act 1992)
- Not listed – Federal (EPBC Act 1999)

Description

- Low shrub to 1.5 metres high.
- Leaves:
 - clustered, small, triangular to narrowly egg-shaped
 - 3-6 mm long x 3-5 mm wide
 - margins entire
 - 3-5 hairy wedge-shaped teeth on the end with the edges turned under.

Flowers and fruit

- Flowers solitary with 4 lance-shaped sepals.
- Flowering occurs from August to October
- Fruiting occurs from November to January.
- Fruit comprises a 3 or 4 winged elliptic to spherical, hairy capsule.

Habitat and distribution

- Recorded from:
 - Amiens, Passchendaele State Forest
 - The Summit, Broadwater State Forest
 - Greenlands, Eukey, Ballandean
 - Wyberba, Girraween National Park.
- Found in heathy shrublands on granite outcrops.
