

Threatened plants of the Granite Belt

Homoranthus montanus (Mountain mouse bush)



Conservation status

- Critically endangered – Qld (NC Act 1992)
- Vulnerable – Federal (EPBC Act 1999)

Description

- Erect shrub to 3 metres.
- Leaves:
 - measure 20 mm long
 - narrowly linear and cylindrical
 - side view is straight or slightly curved.

Flowers and fruit

- Flowers:
 - tubular, occurring in leaf axils
 - cream-coloured, turning red as they age.
- Flowering occurs in October and November.
- Fruit a capsule containing 1 or 2 seeds.

Habitat and distribution

- Recorded from:
 - Stalling Lane, Emu Gully
 - Sundown National Park.
- Found in woodland or exposed sites on granite outcrops.
