

# Threatened plants of the Granite Belt

*Cyanothamnus inflexus* subsp. *inflexus* (Rock boronia)



## Conservation status

- Least concern – Qld (NC Act 1992)
- Not listed – Federal (EPBC Act 1999)

## Description

- Low shrub.
- Branchlets with hairs concentrated in furrows.
- Leaves:
  - comprise 3-5 small, linear leaflets located either side of the stem
  - minutely hairy
  - strongly aromatic.

## Flowers and fruit

- Flowers:
  - white to pink, with a few hairs at the apex
  - petals 2.5-3.5 mm long
  - 4 petals and 8 stamens.
- Flowering occurs from April to October.
- Fruit a capsule containing many seeds.

## Habitat and distribution

- Endemic to the New England Tableland.
- Recorded from:
  - Passchendaele State Forest
  - Pozieres and Cannon Creek
  - Girraween National Park.
- Found in heathy woodlands and shrublands.
