

Threatened plants of the Granite Belt

Eucalyptus scoparia (Wallangarra white gum)



Conservation status

- Vulnerable – Qld (NC Act 1992)
- Vulnerable – Federal (EPBC Act 1999)

Description

- Rare tree 15-20 metres high.
- Bark:
 - smooth, powdery, white and grey
 - shed in narrow strips.
- Leaves:
 - glossy green on both sides
 - linear to lance-shaped or curved
 - 60-120 mm long x 5-15 mm wide
 - leaf stalk 5-17 mm long.

Flowers and fruit

- Mature buds are oval or pear-shaped.
- Flowers white, in clusters of 7.
- Flowering occurs in November.
- Fruit a cup-shaped capsule containing small, black seeds.

Habitat and distribution

- Endemic to the Granite Belt.
- Recorded from:
 - Mt Ferguson near Amiens and
 - Mt Norman in Girraween National Park.
- Found among boulders and in crevices of expansive granite outcrops.
