

Threatened plants of the Granite Belt

Boronia repanda (Granite rose, Border boronia)



Conservation status

- Endangered – Qld (NC Act 1992)
- Endangered – Federal (EPBC Act 1999)

Description

- Erect, woody shrub to 1.5m.
- Leaves:
 - oblong 2-23mm
 - tip blunt
 - margins bent downward
 - glands prominent.

Flowers and fruit

- Flowers:
 - mainly pink in colour (sometimes white)
 - 4 petals and 8 stamens
 - occurring solitary in the axils.
- Flowering occurs from July to November.
- Fruit a capsule containing seed.

Habitat and distribution

- Endemic to the New England Tableland.
- Recorded from:
 - Amiens, Applethorpe, Broadwater State Forest
 - Cannon Creek, Cottonvale, Dalveen
 - Fletcher, Passchendaele State Forest, Pozieres
 - Stanthorpe, The Summit, Thulimbah
- Found in heathy open forests, woodlands and shrublands.
