

Threatened plants of the Granite Belt

Hibbertia elata (Tall guinea flower)



Conservation status

- Near threatened – Qld (NC Act 1992)
- Not listed – Federal (EPBC Act 1999)

Description

- Shrub 1-2 metres high.
- Stems usually hairy.
- Leaves:
 - clustered
 - narrow-linear to narrow-oblongate
 - 15-35 mm long, 1-2 mm wide
 - margins incurved.

Flowers and fruit

- Flowers:
 - petals yellow, numbering 5
 - terminal on short axillary shoots
 - stamens 15-25
 - carpels hairless.
- Flowering occurs from July to October.
- Fruit a follicle that dries to release seeds.

Habitat and distribution

- Endemic to the New England Tableland.
- Recorded from Eukey and Girraween National Park.
- Found in heathy open forests.
