

Threatened plants of the Granite Belt

Bertya glandulosa (Granite Belt bertya-shrub)



Conservation status

- Vulnerable – Qld (NC Act 1992)
- Not listed – Federal (EPBC Act 1999)

Description

- Slender shrub to 2 metres high
- Stem with dense starry hairs.
- Leaves:
 - narrow-linear, 10-30 mm long, 2-3 mm wide
 - narrower end towards the base
 - flat margin, lower surface visible
 - upper surface green, rough with raised dots
 - lower surface is white and densely covered with star-shaped hairs.

Flowers and fruit

- Flowers:
 - male and female reproductive parts occur on one, or different, individuals
 - calyx persistent
- Flowering occurs from September to January.
- Fruit, an elliptic capsule containing seeds.

Habitat and distribution

- Endemic to the Granite Belt.
- Recorded from:
 - Nundubbemere, Glen Aplin, Fletcher
 - Girraween National Park, Ballandean.
- Found on granite outcrops.
