

Threatened plants of the Granite Belt

Acacia pubifolia (Wyberba wattle)



Conservation status

- Endangered – Qld (NC Act 1992)
- Endangered – Federal (EPBC Act 1999)

Description

- Tall shrub or small tree, 3-8 metres high.
- Bark dark and rough.
- Branchlets angular, densely hairy on new growth.
- Glands absent or 1 inconspicuous gland at base of branchlet.
- Leaves:
 - phyllodes elliptic or narrowly egg-shaped
 - 2-10 cm long x 1-3 cm wide
 - velvety hairy
 - contain 1-3 prominent veins.

Flowers and fruit

- Flowers:
 - yellow and cylindrical
 - 2-5 cm long.
- Flowering occurs in September.
- Fruit comprises a linear pod, 3-8 cm long, containing black seeds.

Habitat and distribution

- Endemic to the New England Tableland.
- Recorded from:
 - Fletcher, Ballandean, Wyberba
 - Girraween National Park.
- Found in open forests and woodlands.
